


BOOKS AND LITERACY INFORMATION AND INSPIRATION

HOW CAN WE SAFELY OFFER AND ENCOURAGE BOOK READING IN OUR CLASSROOM?





Offer a wide selection of board books for easy sanitizing.

- Laminate existing paper books, or use plastic sleeves in a binder for easy sanitization.
- Create individual bags (with name labels and/or pictures of child) with a selection of books based on individual interest. These can be changed weekly and eliminates the need for daily sanitization.
 - Create a rotational disinfection schedule that caters to your program's needs.

Books are not just tools for developing literacy, but also a gateway to self-reg discovery and for building relationships.

Offer books to help children navigate through the challenges of Covid-19 – "I don't want to wash my hands", "Thank you Helpers", "If you can't bear hug, Air hug" are just a few examples.
